

GOVERNMENT **ACTION**

In 2014, a 10 year anti-trafficking policy was established. The policy increased funds, staff, coordination, training, and established two government-run shelters for victims.



Of 294 documented cases, only 10 were convicted between 2009 to 2012, despite policy efforts. ACCOUNTABILITY Corruption calls for an increase in accountability of law enforcement and legal systems - especially in training of judges.



Increase number of traffickers prosecuted and charged. Increase funds and coordination.

Decrease impunity for crimes against women. **ENFORCEMENT** Increase educational and economic opportunities. Partner with tourism industry to increase awareness.

A bill was passed in 2016 requiring authorities to begin an immediate search for women reported missing. Previously, the police dismissed these reports. By doing an immediate search, women are less likely to disappear into trafficking networks.
